### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Welcome to Principles of Financial Accounting! Financial accounting is the measurement of economic activity, and financial statements are the key products of this measurement process. The objective of the course is for you to learn how to read, understand, and analyze financial statements, the key measurement of economic activities for firms. The focus of this course is to learn the methods and rules used to develop financial statements, interpret and analyze financial information, and understand where there is discretion in reporting financial results. The course is intended for students with no prior accounting background and will focus more on real-life examples than other traditional introductory financial accounting courses.

The course will begin with basic accounting concepts and principles. Throughout the course, we will go over the main financial statements: balance sheet, income statement, statement of cash flows, and statement of stockholders' equity. Particular attention is paid to exploring how these four statements are constructed, how they relate to each other, and how they convey information about the financial health of a company.

### MATERIALS

- There is **NO required textbook** for this course. All the lecture notes, slides, and assignments will be posted on Brightspace.
- If you really need a textbook for reference, my recommended one is Libby, Libby, and Hodge (LLH) Fundamentals of Financial Accounting, 11th edition (McGraw-Hill). Note that the exam will be solely based on lecture notes, slides, pre-recorded videos and assignments, but NOT on LLH.

#### Memos:

After each lecture, you are **required to submit a memo to reflect on your key takeaways and share any confusion about the lecture content.** The memos will let me know the topics that need further clarification. I will read every memo and your questions raised in the memo will be addressed in the next class. Each after-class memo will be open for 24 hours, starting from the end of every class, and will constitute 1% of your course grade. Please finish it on time so that I can prepare for the class accordingly.

#### Homework:

The homework is designed to let you familiarize yourself with the concepts and methods taught in class. I will give FIVE assignments in total. The tentative due date can be viewed in the Class Schedule. I will post the homework on Brightspace one week before the due date, and you should finish it individually. I encourage collaborations when finishing your homework, but each student will need to submit her own copy before the deadline.

You should submit **a single typed PDF document** for each homework. Please include all your work and corresponding question number in that PDF file. Any other attachments will not be graded. The submission portal will be closed at the exact due time, and no late homework will be accepted.

#### Exams:

There will be one midterm and one final exam during the semester. All exams will be open book and open notes. Please note that you can use your personal notes but any discussion, collaboration, screenshots, sharing of answers or any other correspondence with an outside source is a violation of the honor code (and it will hurt your standing in the class). Although the exams are open book, there is no time to "hunt and gather" answers so I highly recommend you prepare accordingly. The midterm exam will cover the materials until Lecture 5 of the slides/notes. The final exam will be cumulative, but the focus will be the materials that are not covered in the midterm.

### Participation/Attendance:

As this course is conducted online, consistent attendance via Zoom is required. Your login and log-out times will be monitored during each class, and maintaining punctuality and full participation will contribute 5% towards your overall course grade. While it is highly recommended that you enable your camera during class sessions, we understand that some may have concerns. If necessary, please email me to discuss your situation. Habitual absence or camera-off attendance without a valid reason is considered unprofessional and may impact your grades.

This course will also incorporate group exercises using Zoom's 'breakout room' feature. Engage actively in these discussions, as I will visit each room to monitor progress and address any questions. Active participation in group activities will account for another 5% of your final grade.

### **Pre-Recorded Videos:**

There will be occasionally pre-recorded videos that I would like you to watch before class. Please watch them as we will not go over the materials with you in details during the class but only discuss the questions you have. The materials covered in the pre-recorded videos will appear in the exam.

### **Brightspace:**

I will use Brightspace to make announcements, email you, and post lecture notes, assignments, and other course material. So please make sure you check our site on a regular basis.

## Gradescope:

All your assignments and exams should be submitted to Gradescope. I will send you the instructions before the class.

## Class Recordings:

With few exceptions, all classes will be recorded. The recordings are available on Zoom tab of Brightspace.
