Course Description:

The prerequisite for this course is the basic accounting course or its equivalent. The class sessions for this course will be conducted partly as a lecture by the instructor and partly as an open discussion. You are expected to attend each class session in person. In the event of unforeseen circumstances that require students to miss one or more classes, classes will be recorded and available for online viewing. Each student is expected to read the assignments in the textbook prior to class, prepare the assigned problems, be aware of relevant tax law and take a constructive part in the discussion.

Textbooks:

The following textbooks are required and need to be brought to class for a discussion of the assignments: *Pearson's Federal Taxation 2023 Individuals*, Timothy J. Rupert; Kenneth E. Anderson; David S. Hulse.

Assignments and Examinations:

An in-class midterm and final examination has been scheduled during the term.

Each chapter is expected to be read before class.
